## OUT OF THE CLASSROOM!

### *Field Experiences and Great Resources for Middle School Designed by Teachers for Teachers*

The Out of the Classroom! model of building authentic communities of learning between informal educators and teachers was begun in the Austin area with local funding in 2006. After expressed interest from informal educators in implementing more projects, ISEA recently partnered with the Texas Regional Collaboratives for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Teaching (TRC) in a preliminary proposal to NSF to expand the program statewide and focus on the professional development of informal educators. *Out of the Classroom: A Community of Learning Professional Development Model for Informal Educators* is a proposed project designed to investigate how professional development for informal educators can effectively address the needs of local communities. The focus will

be to build a community of learning around the shared goal of identifying the strengths of informal institutions to address secondary science needs. We propose to invite 27 informal institutions from nine geographic areas over four years to work with teachers and scientists to design programs for secondary students in the STEM areas. We will provide leadership and professional development through our model, sharing of research, a website space and help in finding partners. The project team includes Christy Youker, PhD, Debbie Junk, PhD (Math Initiative Coordinator for TRC), Jim Barufaldi, PhD (Principal Investigator for TRC) and Amy Moreland, a doctoral student at the Univ. of Texas. We are excited about these future possibilities!

## NSTA CONGRESS UPDATE

National Science Teacher Association (NSTA) held its summer congress, "Charting a Course for the Year of Science" in San Antonio this year. Delegates at the congress were representatives from the state science teacher organizations and NSTA affiliates. Since ISEA is an affiliate of the Science Teacher's Association of Texas (STAT), rather than an affiliate of NSTA, Kiki Corry, president of ISEA, was there as an attendee only. But what an interesting and productive experience!

Five focus groups met to discuss science teaching issues such as teacher retention, science technology engineering and math (STEM), 21<sup>st</sup> century learning skills, and research based education. Kiki participated in the "Anchoring Science Content in the National Standards" focus group. What science content will really be important in the upcoming decades and how will that be expressed? The discussions of the focus groups were boiled down into resolutions that were presented to the congress. After the motions containing the resolutions were passed, they progressed to the NSTA council and then to the board.

While the NSTA council and board were meeting, the attendees and delegates attended workshops. These workshops, rather than the teacher-oriented ones you might expect at a conference, were for leadership. Topics such as getting published, using media, and budgeting were offered. Kiki attended parliamentary procedure 101, strategic planning, enhancing membership, and a roundtable discussion on pre-k programs.

All this work rested gracefully on the backdrop of the San Antonio River Walk. There was time in the evenings to stroll and shop and visit with old and new friends. And of course, how could science teachers gather in San Antonio and not go to Sea World? Even diehard classroom teachers can't resist the draw of an informal science experience. Although the skies opened up and poured rain, canceling the Shamu show, and making exploration rather soggy, great fun was had in the arcade using the game passes provided with dinner.

Kudos to Vanessa Westbrook and Tara Schulz for bringing this event to the attention of the ISEA board and suggesting that ISEA send someone.
